Lionel Bennett Gone Flying For Ever

I had known Lionel all of my life, it would be more accurate to say that he had known me from the day I was born. He had been friends with my dad since their school days in Gillingham, building and flying models during the war years, on many spare bits of land. Lionel did an apprenticeship as a carpenter/cabinet maker, and was a very good one from the jobs that I saw. When they were called for national service, Lionel and my dad both joined the RAF.

After national service, the modelling carried on and I believe Lionel was one of the founder members of the Medway Pirates club, then there was the original Medway MFC. Those of you that saw Lionel's models would agree that he was a very good aero modeller, though the joke was that his models were built from teak, as they were so heavy, he used to say they were built to last. He would come around to our house with his latest model, and as a kid in the 50's and 60's I was in awe of these models, mainly control line models then.

We were all members of the Elliot Model Engineering Club by then, flying control line models from the car parks at Rochester Airport. Lionel had a thing for Jaguar cars, and my dad and I were taken by Lionel to the 1966 Nationals at Hullavington in Wiltshire in his Mk 10 Jag, (I think!) I seemed to have a huge amount of room in the back as we did a 100 mph down the A4 passed the white horse around the Marlborough area! He had several other marks of Jag after that.

When this Medway MFC was formed in '74, my dad and I asked Lionel to come and join, but when he found out cost of the membership fees, in typical Lionel fashion he nearly choked as shouted 'OW MUCH!!, we'd been used to paying 2/6- then 50p to be a member of Elliott's, to pay £18.00 was a big jump! There were only about 7 of us at the time, trying to hire a field. Lionel did relent about a year later and joined.

Lionel also used to build wonderful plastic models as well. He was hoping to start building a few plastic models when I saw him in hospital about 3 or 4 week ago, but it was not to be. We will miss his presence at the club meetings. Our sympathies go out to his wife Jean, son Nigel, daughter Caroline, and stepson Steve.

One of my overriding memories of Lionel, was at Stickfast Lane, when he was flying his vintage Buccaneer radio model, quite a large model, he got himself totally disorientated by flying around in tight circles low to the ground, if fact I think he made himself dizzy, then there was a crump sound followed silence then a shredding noise! He'd flown the model into the ground, it then bounced up and hit the fence, damaging the fence, and leaving a big rut in field the where it made contact, so maybe there is something to be said for making your models from teak?
